Foreward

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Introduction

- The Arab-Israeli conflict began over 100 years ago. Why has it lasted so long? What do the sides want, and are their desires so far apart that no compromise solution can be found? Do they all want to find a solution?
- The Israelis say they want peace and a two-state solution, though a minority of them say that they want the whole of Israel and the West Bank.
- The Palestinians say that they also want a two-state solution. However, Hamas, which controls Gaza, and many of the neighbouring Arab states say that they want a Palestinian state on the whole of what is now Israel, the West Bank and Gaza.
- There are two 'narratives', each side giving a different account of events past and present.
- Some people say that world terrorism is caused by the Arab-Israeli conflict; others think that it happens because of British and U.S foreign policy; yet others, including many in the Arab world, are convinced it is because of the Iranian leaders say they want to control the whole of the Middle East, and the intention of the Islamic State (IS) to create an Islamic caliphate.
- In the following slides, events leading up to the present crisis will be explored, the issues of today's conflict will be examined, the ethics of war, the media, religious aspects, and the ways we here in the UK are affected by these events will be looked at.
- The main aim of this work is to alert students to the fact that, when studying events past or
 present, it is essential to look at what both sides are saying. They will then be able to reach
 their own conclusions as to the causes, and they may also find solutions which so far have
 been intractable.

Notes

- 1. Throughout, the term 'West Bank' has been used to describe the area known previously as Judea and Samaria.
- 2. Jordan renamed the area 'The West Bank' when it annexed it in 1948.
- 3. For reasons of simplicity, the views of both sides of the conflict have been described as those of the Israelis, or those of the Palestinians or Arabs. It must be noted, however,

that there are many varying opinions on both sides, and that there are Israelis who believe the Palestinian point of view, and those in the Arab world who endorse that of the Israelis.


